OUR MISSION

At Red Hook Initiative (RHI) we believe that social change to overcome systemic inequities begins with empowered youth. In partnership with community adults, we nurture young people in Red Hook to be inspired, resilient and healthy, and to envision themselves as co-creators of their lives, community and society.

Each year, RHI impacts the lives of over 6,500 residents of Red Hook.

The majority of RHI program participants live in the NYC Housing Authority Red Hook Houses—Brooklyn's largest public housing development.

The Red Hook Houses are comprised of 32 buildings on 39 acres of land.

Since our founding in 2002, RHI has prioritized the needs of this historically under-resourced community by confronting the impacts of racial inequity and decades of disinvestment.

This report details the impact of RHI's 2019 program year (July 1, 2018 – June 30, 2019).

INEQUITIES FACING OUR COMMUNITY

Half of families with children under 18 live below the federal poverty line

Youth Development

Each year, RHI engages over 450 youth from 6th grade through age 24.

RHI believes social change begins with empowered youth. Our youth development programs offer year-round support for middle schoolers, high schoolers and young adults. These programs ensure that Red Hook youth can work toward academic success, explore careers, develop life skills, strengthen social support systems and lead by example in their neighborhood.



Middle School Program

Our daily after-school program for 6th-8th graders supports middle school youth to succeed in school, develop life skills and exercise leadership in the neighborhood.

In 2019, 100% of 8th graders graduated from middle school and enrolled in their first choice for high school.



Freedom Schools

In 2018, RHI began partnering with the Children's Defense Fund to host Freedom Schools, a literacy and cultural enrichment program rooted in the legacy of the 1964 Mississippi Freedom Summer Project. The program promotes literacy, civic engagement and social action among youth and their families by developing reading skills and reducing the learning loss that often occurs during summer vacation. Participants take home relevant books each week to feed their curiosity and augment home libraries.

High School Youth Leader Program

Youth Leaders access academic support and leadership opportunities while creating a positive impact within their community. This year's participants earned a regular paycheck as Teen Chefs, Youth Organizers, Peer Health Educators, Peer Counselors, Photojournalists and Farm Apprentices. Through extracurricular programs, youth learned about a range of career paths, expressed themselves creatively and freely explored their identities.

PEER-LED HEALTH CARE APPROACHES

Youth Leaders reached over 900 peers through reproductive health fairs, workshops on topics relevant to Red Hook teens and mental health awareness events. Teenagers are the most likely to experience the onset of mental health challenges, but the least likely to access services. The stressors facing Red Hook youth stem from interpersonal trauma, violence and systemic inequities.

This year, 91% of Youth Leaders who screened positive for a mental health need received support. We attribute this success to our holistic approach to trauma-informed, healing-centered youth development grounded in community building and peer leadership.

Headed to college debt-free

Jasmin was selected as a recipient of the **Jordan Brand Wings Scholarship**, a competitive annual award given to 24 high school seniors nationwide. Jasmin was chosen for her determination, authenticity and potential for greatness. She is currently enrolled in the State University of New York at Geneseo.

Young Adult Program

With RHI's support, young adults aged 19–24 set individual goals for academics (high school diploma, HSE or college degree), employment and professional or personal growth.

225 young adults served

Through our **College Scholars Program**, young adults receive help navigating financial aid applications, arranging and attending college tours, managing class enrollment and schedules and finding internships and jobs in line with their interests and majors.

RHI offers job training, coaching and work-readiness sessions to help young adults set and achieve employment and school-related goals. Our social workers provide counseling and social service support to address pressing needs related to housing, food security, mental and physical health and legal needs.

In 2019, RHI offered the only program for LGBTQ-identifying youth in Red Hook.

Envisioning the future of Red Hook

Keturah joined RHI's youth programs over a decade ago. Since then, our long-term approach has helped Keturah graduate from SUNY Albany and find her first job out of school working as a Community Development Intern with Karp Strategies. Keturah now mentors an RHI College Scholar who is pursuing a degree from her alma mater and she is considering enrolling in graduate school.

Being able to see my work implemented into the community is something that I need in order to be happy in a career.



Participants in RHI's **Digital Stewards program**, a paid, 160-hour training program for young adults, maintained and promoted the Red Hook WIFI network, coordinated tech-related projects and events and gained valuable media production skills.

More than 7,000 residents are now able to access free and reliable internet via Red Hook WIFI.

Community Building through local leadership

Our Community Building Impact

Over 500 residents attended RHI's community events.

49 Local Leaders graduated from the emergency preparedness and community organizing program.

250 Red Hook residents voted in Participatory Budgeting at RHI.

\$500,000 in Participatory Budgeting funds was awarded to an irrigation system on the Columbia Street Farm.

20 Red Hook residents mobilized for a campaign to restore gas to over 60 families.

Our approach builds leadership of youth and adult residents to address issues facing the neighborhood. Community building programs work to drive positive change and increase social cohesion to build a more resilient Red Hook. In 2019, the Community Building team, through the Local Leaders and Youth Organizers programs, prioritized issues such as unsafe public housing conditions, discriminatory over-policing and transit access.

This year, community building programs engaged over 500 local residents through leadership development trainings, criminal justice and public housing advocacy, participatory action research and events to increase access to resources.

To be called a Local Leader is to accomplish something.

OUR STRATEGIES

Youth Organizers were trained in the history of advocacy and current campaigns in NYC, participated in community meetings, town halls and voter mobilization efforts and met with state legislators to advocate for more funding for public housing in the New York State budget.

Red Hook adults trained through **RHI's Local Leaders program** gained skills in emergency preparedness and community organizing. Their efforts and partnership with local elected officials resulted in gas restoration for over 60 families after an outage that lasted three months.

Real Rites, a team of seven young adult researchers, released findings from their 18-month project focused on **community-led solutions to violence** in a report titled "Young Adults' Experiences of Violence and Dreams of Community-Led Solutions." The team developed a model of violence prevention for young adults; hosted community forums for youth and local stakeholders; and presented to students, researchers and city agencies about their research process and findings.

Although skeptical of RHI at first, she was impressed with the Local Leaders program, and "fell in love with the fact that they were engaging young people." Blondel now facilitates the Community Organizing, Political Education and Climate Justice component of the Local Leader training.

In late 2018, RHI took over management of Added Value, one of Brooklyn's first and largest urban farms, and re-launched as Red Hook Farms—an innovative model for urban gardening, youth development and community-led food production.

Our barrier-breaking leaders

As RHI's Education Manager, Tarik empowers hundreds of youth to strive towards their academic aspirations. He believes it's critical to forge connections with academically rigorous institutions on behalf of our Youth Leaders. After completing Career Accelerator, Tarik reflected:

> This opportunity allowed me to think about the ways in which I would like to improve my skills as a leader and develop them in real time.

The RHI Institute offers programs that build on the strengths, resiliency and tenacity of Red Hook's current and future leaders. We created this approach to confront and reduce barriers to professional advancement that are rooted in systemic inequities and racism.

INSTITUTE PROGRAMS

RHI Fellows is a competitive training program open to young professionals from the neighborhood. As part-time, paid employees of RHI, Fellows receive professional development, mentorship and job support services to secure employment or further education in their desired fields.

Career Accelerator is a competitive year-long program for staff who have worked at RHI for at least one year. Participants are paired with a mentor, receive monthly coaching and engage in professional development workshops, as they work toward ambitious goals such as becoming an Executive Director, opening a therapeutic healing space or pursuing a Masters degree in health policy.


